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

# Chance Find Identified

Teacher, Grocer, Postmaster, Farmer

Like so many other finds, this sketch from the HISTORY OF BAY COUNTY (Michigan) jumped out of the book while we were looking for something else entirely. It tells about Frederick William Dunham (b. 1832)(9)(Deacon John 1, John 2, Samuel 3, Wm 4, Wm 5, Jonathan 6, Hazael 7, Alpha 8). man is called "William Frederick" in the IWD book; which name is correct perhaps doesn't matter. He does have the honor of being the first person to be identified through the useful new Dunham Index. "FREDERICK WILLIAM DUNHAM, whose post office address is West Bay City, is a prominent & prosperous farmer living in Section 21, Monitor Twp. He was born in Madison Co., NY, Oct. 18, 1832 & is a son of Alpha & Freelove (Mathewson) Dunham. His education was obtained mostly in the district schools of the Empire State & in an academy at Hamilton, NY. He then engaged in teaching for a short time near Adrian, Mich. From Adrian he went to Higginsport, Ohio as instructor in the High School, of which he later became principal, which post he held for 4 years. In the winter of 1858-59 he was in New Orleans & in flatboats traded in produce along the bayous of the lower Miss. River. In 1860 Mr. Dupham visited his early home in NY, where he remained until 1861, when he came to Bay City to take charge of the public schools as superintendent. There was then but 1 public school building in Bay City; it had 3 departments. years later he resigned this position & opened a grocery on Water St. under the name of Phillips & Dunham. On account of ill health he sold his interest to Mr. Phillips 4 years later & engaged in farming in Barry Co., Mich. In connection with his brother-in-law he bought 200 acres of land. This was but partly cleared, & they built a house & barn; on this property Mr. Dunham lived 3 years. At the request of his former business partner, Mr Phillips, who was then postmaster (Cont'd p. 2)

From Ann Eldred, DD has this picture from a catalogue of dollhouses, # 75 being the unusual Dunham's Cocoanut Doll's House. 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FREDERICK W. DUNHAM (cont'd from p. 1) under Pres. Grant, Mr. Dunham returned to Bay City to act as assistant postmaster. In this capacity he served 8 years. Under the Hayes administration he was appointed postmaster of Bay City, & continued thus for 1 term. He then located on a farm of 320 acres, which he had purchased in connection with Herschel H. Hatch, now an attorney of Detroit. They cleared, fenced & drained most of this land. On it they built 2 houses & what was considered in those days a very large barn, its dimensions being 80 by 80 feet. Mr. Dunham has been married twice, his first wife being Mary E. Haughton, of Madison Co., NY. His 2nd wife was Emma A. Haughton, of the same county. They were sisters, both being daughters of Augustus Haughton. Mr. & Mrs. Dunham had a son, Eugene, who died when 13 years old; & 2 daughters, Mrs. James ((Helen)) Wilcox of Monitor Twp., & Florence, who lives with her parents. The subject of this sketch gives considerable attention to dairy farming, the production & sale of milk being the main feature of his farm. He is the possessor of a good library & spends a great deal of time with his books. In politics Mr. Dunham is a staunch Republican, & voted for Gen. John C. Fremont, the 1st presidential candidate of that party, in 1856. In local political matters, he acts independently. He is a member of the Patrons of Husbandry & is a past master of Subordinate Grange # 1036." ---This sketch does push our information a bit further forward, as his daughter Helen's married name is new data. Too, we note that Frederick William is a grandson of Hazael Dunham (1776-1859) of Dunham's Island. (DD 4-93)

### WILLIAM G. H. DUNHAM

From Mrs. Arthur A. Dunham, Gainesville, FL, DD has a quantity of interesting materials, which, unfortunately, we cannot tie in at the present time. Among these materials is this March 14, 1892 obituary from the MANCHESTER (N.H.) UNION: "WILLIAM G. H. DUNHAM PASSES AWAY AFTER A SHORT ILLNESS. He was 48 years, 2 months & 20 days old & died at his home at 108 Riddle St. of a "complication of diseases." He'd been sick for 2 years, but had been able to work until quite recently, & his death surprised many of his A native of Morrisville, VT, he was the son of John E. & Eliza C. (Clark) Dunham. He'd been living in Manchester for the past 25 years, more or less, & employed first by Barr & Clapp, grocers, & then by Allen M. Clapp, for whom he was the highly respected business manager. He was a Rupublican & the member of 4 local Masonic bodies: Washington Lodge # 61, Trinity Commandery, Knights Templar, Mt. Horeb Royal Arch Chapter # 11 & Adironam Council # 3, Royal & Select Masters. Also of the Louis Bell Post of the G. A. R. He came home from the war wearing the stripes of captain. His survivors were his widow & 2 brothers, Guy B. Dunham of Manchester & Edward Dunham of Morrisville, VT. His funeral was held from the South Main Union Congregational Church, & he was buried in the Piscataguog Yard directly behind the church."

### MRS. VINCENT S. MADISON

In the June 1993 DD we published 2 Petersburg, MI newspaper clippings which were submitted by Karen Hill, Half Moon Bay, CA., concerning the 1911 marriage of Arvilla Dunham (1890-1913)(9)(Deacon John 1, Joseph 2, Eleazer 3, Israel 4, Ebenezer 5, Sylvanus 6, Dr. Nelson 7, Norman Curtis 8) to Roy S. Swinton, & then of her death so shortly afterward in the Philippines. Karen also shared this clipping from the ALPENA (MI) NEWS, the obituary of Arvilla's only child: "Monday, June 23, 1975. Mrs. Vincent S. Madison, 62, of 1925 Somerset, Troy, died at 6 a.m. Sunday, June 22, at Alpena Hospital, after an extended illness. Born Mary J. Swinton on May 12, 1913, in Manilla, Philippine Islands, she graduated from Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti & had been an elementary school teacher in the Warren School system until her retirement. Her husband, Vincent, preceded her in death. Mrs. Madison is survived by 4 children: Mrs. Paul Warning (Gayle) of Ojai, CA; Mrs. John D. Fitzgerald, Jr. (Nancy) of Alpena; Stanley V. of Grand Rapids; & Gary S. of Pontiac; 5 grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Barbara Moody of Ann Arbor; & one brother, Stanley Swinton of New York City. Madison's body is at the Wachterhauser Funeral Home, where friends may call. A memorial service will be held at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at the 1st Congregational Church, Rev. John D. Fitzgerald officiating. Burial in Charlevoix Cemetery."
