President's Letter

For the last several years, I have been spending some time using the family tree DNA “family finder” testing. This is formally called autosomal DNA testing. The mother and father both contribute to this DNA – so it traces both maternal and paternal lines. It is normally used to trace back a couple of generations to find cousins, uncles, etc. I made efforts to gather together more than 10 of us who descended from the Dunhams of St Andrews/St George, New Brunswick Canada. I then looked at our common matches – these would be people that we are related to in common and since we are distantly related – are connections back into the time we are interested in – the 1700s. In looking at common matches between us, we were able to use this DNA test to look back further than the typical 2-3 generations.

I thought I would pass along a couple of things I have learned on this “journey” :

1. For most in the U.S. there is a large impact in DNA contribution from the large Irish migration into the United States from the “potato famine” – so searching back a few generations and looking for matches you need to filter out many matches due to this Irish component. e.g. there are many Irish DNA segment matches between those in our “group of 10” from New Brunswick that we get common matches that have nothing to do with our English Dunham roots.
2. I have found useful information on a Henry Langmaid line that I am related to that came to Deer Island, NB during/after the loyalist migration to Canada. My father's autosomal test matched a person who had Minot Langmaid in NH. He had a brother named Henry Langmaid and I had seen him before – but he was listed as “Patriot” – serving to fight the British. The DNA results made me realize that his loyalties changed during the war or he was forced into service when the battle lines moved throughout the war. Before this, I would draw lines – either a patriot or a loyalist – but in reality many were forced into service by whoever controlled the area at the time. For example, the Americans would be in control and say – sign an oath of loyalty to us or lose your property.
3. For my Dunham line in New Brunswick, I proved a relationship between Joseph Dunham and my William Hickman Dunham (b 1798) by finding a proved descendant of

Joseph Dunham and for his DNA testing I found Brian Dunham via his family tree on ancestry.com. His autosomal DNA test showed he had the same common matches as others in our group of St Andrews, NB Dunhams – which proved this familial connection. Adele Dunham recently joined our assn. and had her brother's Y-DNA tested – she is of this same line (A note to you Adele!).

4. I have found common matches that lead me to relatives in the Deer Isle, Maine area. And the Dunhams of Deer Isle, Maine is the subject of Gratia's article this month – to tie these two pieces of work together.
5. The most useful thing I have found in the autosomal DNA testing is finding others who I am related to along this line I am researching and sharing our information. It is very rewarding to find someone and fill in the blanks for them in our New Brunswick Dunham line. It is even more rewarding to find another distant cousin! And when we find another person – we add them to our “group of 10” from New Brunswick. We now have enough folks in our group that we can confirm a relationship in our particular Dunham group by using autosomal DNA testing and looking at common matches.

We have mainly focused on Y-DNA testing here in the past – this traces the male line and is extremely useful to determine which Dunham line you reside in. Additionally, I encourage all members to participate in the autosomal DNA testing available from Family Tree DNA. It can help you and others by finding relatives here and also help others link themselves to your family and learn more from your Dunham family tree.

Editor's Corner

This "Double Issue" of the Dunham Genealogy Research Association newsletter will focus on the Dunhams of Deer Isle, Maine. Along with other researchers I have spent more than twenty years researching the Dunhams of Deer Isle. There is information of Elijah Dunham in "Records of Deer Isle Maine" by Hosmer which documents the arrival of Elijah and his two sons Elijah and Joseph as arriving there in 1766. Thus we know that this Dunham family lived in Deer Isle well before the influx of any United Empire Loyalists in the years after 1784. Early research on Elijah Dunham can therefore exclude those families.

The focus of attention should be on the many settlers from the coastal regions of Massachusetts (mainly around Plymouth) who flocked to Northern Maine (then still a part of Massachusetts), Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Many of these families were fishermen, or came for shipbuilding or the timber industry.

Several members of the Dunham Genealogy Research Association, including President Jeffrey M. Dunham, are descended from Elijah⁶ Dunham. What causes confusion however is the lack of vital records for this remote area, and the fact that these Dunham men had children by successive wives.

This article will serve to document information that has been gathered to date, and list the children by the wives of Elijah⁶, and Elijah⁷ and Joseph⁷ Dunham. I have carried out several of the lines to the thirteenth generation, but this is no-where near being a complete genealogy of this particular family. The family and children of Joseph⁷ Dunham have been the most difficult to document. Research done by Richard Thorne and Jeffrey M. Dunham has allowed us to show some of the children of Joseph⁷ but there may be other children for whom no information exists. By the same token, it may eventually be proven that the early children given to Joseph⁷ belong elsewhere. Until any evidence of that is found, I have compiled this family according to the best circumstantial evidence that I can find.

What has prompted me to release this article now is that in October of 2018 a query from Adele Dunham gave her line of descent through a child of the second wife of Joseph⁷ Dunham. Jeffrey M. Dunham is a descendant of the first wife of Joseph⁷ Dunham. Circumstantial evidence gathered by Richard Thorne prompts us to think that a baptismal record (dated 1798) shows four children who were probably children of Joseph⁷ Dunham and his first wife. This evidence will be expanded below under the section on Joseph⁷ Dunham.

Three Dunham men have participated in DNA analysis. They are Jeffrey M. Dunham, Leverett "Skip" Earl Dunham, Jr. and the brother of Adele who is Nate Dunham. All three DNA results match exactly those of Deacon John Dunham descendants. We also have the excellent genealogical research done by Richard Thorne on his line which comes from Phoebe Ann Dunham who married Richard Butler Thorn. We also have work done by Blair Meeting, another descendant of this Dunham line. Recently, thanks to the excellent research done by Adele

Dunham we have a clear picture of her line of descent from Elisha H. Dunham, son of the second wife of Joseph ⁷ Dunham.

I want to say a little bit about the religious background and political leanings of these Dunhams. That they were descended from Leyden Pilgrims cannot be denied. The early churches in Plymouth Colony were Congregational or Baptist but as these families moved north into the wilderness it became more and more difficult to attend a church of their choice. What was important however was baptism of children—even if this could not always be accomplished when the children were infants.

We also see that this Dunham family moved frequently between Deer Isle (which is in the US) and St. George and St. Andrews (which are in New Brunswick, Canada.) St. George in particular was settled by a large number of loyalists who arrived there in 1784 under the leadership of Peter Clinch. These arriving families were Anglican, and I think it is fairly easy to see how the two groups might have melded both in religion and in political leanings as years and generations, and the necessity of defense, progressed.

I invite any questions, comments or additions to the genealogy as presented in this issue. My goal is to get this in print where it can be seen and evaluated, and revised where necessary.

Dunhams of Deer Isle, Maine trace back to George Soule of *The Mayflower*

For many years I have thought that Elijah Dunham, b. in Plymouth, Massachusetts on 7 February 1735/6 was the man who migrated to Deer Isle, Maine by 1766. I have however, reserved this information until I could finish researching any other possible man by the name of Elijah Dunham who might have been this individual. Now, after twenty plus years of researching the Deer Isle Dunham family, I believe that the Elijah Dunham, b. 7 February 1735/6 is the Deer Isle man. I have found no other Elijah who could be the progenitor of the Deer Isle Dunham line. DNA analysis of descendants of Elijah shows that he belonged to the Deacon John Dunham line as will be seen below.

Proof of Elijah's line back to George Soule of *The Mayflower* is found in *Mayflower Families Through Five Generations, Volume Three-George Soule* published by The General Society of Mayflower Descendants in 1980. There has been a revision of this book, but the information about Elijah Dunham's ancestry has not changed.

George¹ Soule was born in England between 1593-1600 and died in Duxbury, Massachusetts before 22 January 1679 the date his inventory was taken. George Soule married probably in Plymouth by 1626 Mary Bucket/Becket who arrived prior to 31 July 1623 aboard the *Anne*. Further information about her is lacking. George Soule joined the company of adventurers, which included the pilgrims, as a "servant" to Pilgrim Edward Winslow. George Soule was a signer of the Mayflower Compact on 11 November 1620. He became a relatively well-to-do leader, business man and office holder in Plymouth Colony.

Mary² Soule (George¹) b. probably in Duxbury, Massachusetts ca. 1644; d. in Plymouth after 1720. She married ca. 1666 John Peterson. He was born ca. 1636; died in Duxbury between 29 April 1718 and 26 March 1720, the dates on which his will was written and later proved.

Benjamin³ Peterson (Mary² Soule, George¹) was born in Duxbury in September 1699; d. in Duxbury 11 February 1760. He married in Duxbury 9 February 1698/99 Hannah Wadsworth, daughter of John and Abigail (Andrews) Wadsworth. She died in Duxbury 6/7 February 1732/3.

Anne⁴ Peterson (Benjamin³ Mary² Soule, George¹) birth date unknown but about 1712; died before 1783 as she is not named in the will of her husband. She married in Duxbury 7 April 1735 Nathaniel Dunham, son of Eleazer and Miriam (Phillips) Dunham. Nathaniel Dunham was b. in Plymouth 4 January 1710/11; died in Plymouth ca. 1783.

Children of Nathaniel and Anne (Peterson) Dunham: from *Mayflower Families – George Soule*:
NOTE: These children are the 5th generation in the Soule line, but the 6th generation in the

Dunham line, thus they are numbered as in the Dunham family, the line back from Elijah is Nathaniel ⁵, Eleazer ^{4,3} Joseph ² John ¹: (further information on the web site www.dunham-singletary.org)

There is precedent for some of the Dunham families of this generation to leave Plymouth and head north to the fishing colonies along the Bay of Fundy and Nova Scotia. This took place in the mid 1760s, well before the Revolutionary War. In fact the sister of Nathaniel ⁵ Dunham who was Feare ⁵ Dunham died in Liverpool, Nova Scotia in 1774. Feare ⁵ had married 7 May 1731 Jacob Curtis and he died probably at sea before 22 January 1752 when Fear Curtis, widow of Jacob Curtis, late of Plymouth, mariner, deceased, was appointed administratrix of her husband's estate. Two of the daughters of Jacob and Feare (Dunham) Curtis went to Nova Scotia and were married shortly after they arrived. Theirs was the first double wedding in Liverpool, Queens Co., Nova Scotia. On 21 Mar. 1762, Fear Curtis married Richard Kempton, and Sarah Curtis married Joseph Woods." [From an article in TAG, Vol. 54:227 by M. W. Saunders "What Happened to Jacob and Fear (Dunham) Curtis?"]

A brother of Nathaniel ⁵ Dunham who was Ezekiel ⁵ Dunham is of record in Gloucester, Massachusetts where he married second in Gloucester Massachusetts "as Ezekiel Donham, sojourner" 24 January 1750 Susanna Riggs. Gloucester, of course, is a well known Massachusetts fishing port.

MAKING SENSE OF THE DEER ISLE MAINE DUNHAMS

As we've seen in the previous article this is the Dunham family that came to Deer Isle, Maine. There are still problems in identifying all the members of this family. Let us look first at an excerpt describing the arrival of Elijah⁶ Dunham to Deer Isle, Maine. Note that the first permanent settlement on Deer Isle was made in 1762 by William Eaton.

From *An Historical Sketch of the Town of Deer Isle, Maine*, by George Lawrence Hosmer, pub. 1886, Boston, Press of Stanley and Usher; p. 90;

"Elijah Dunham, Sr. with his sons Elijah and Joseph Dunham occupied the lot westerly of that of Mr. Eaton, on what is still known as Dunham's Point, upon which is located the silver-mine, which is being operated. Mr. Dunham was twice married, and by his first wife he had the two sons mentioned and a daughter, the wife of Mr. Samuel Pickering and the mother of the late Captain Samuel and Mr. Daniel Pickering. Mr. Pickering settled what is known as Pickering's Island, lying northwesterly of Deer Island, which is not included within the territorial limits of the town. By his last wife Mr. Dunham had one son, the late Mr. Elisha H. Dunham, and two daughters. He did not remain long on the lot taken up by him, and it came into the possession of Messrs. Mark Haskell (cont. p. 91) & Sons, and was the property of Ignatius Haskell, Esq. at his death. Mr. Dunham lived upon several other lots of land. He died in this town at an advanced age. His son Elijah Dunham, Jr. was three times married: first to the daughter of Captain Mark Haskell, by whom he had one son and three daughters; his second wife was the mother of Mr. George G. Choate; his last wife was Miss Polly Morey, a daughter of Mr. Elias Morey. He died in 1852, at the age of ninety years. Mr. Joseph Dunham married the widow of Mr. Charles Chatto, and died not long after the year 1830. The lot taken up by them is now owned principally by Mr. Ebenezer J. Eaton."

For clarification we will number these Dunhams beginning with **Elijah⁶ Dunham as number 1.**

1. Elijah⁶ Dunham (Nathaniel⁵ Eleazer^{4,3} Joseph² John¹) born in Plymouth 7 February 1735/6, [Plymouth VR p. 115] died shortly before 1 Feb. 1813. He married first an unknown wife. He married second Ruth (unknown) who survived him.

Ref. from Records of Deer Isle Maine by Haskell, entry 156 under date of 27 March 1813 "Mr. Ezekiel Alexander of Deer Isle intent of marriage with Mrs. Ruth Dunham of Deer Isle. Note: Feb. 16, 1813 Town of Deer Isle received bills from B(enj) Cole for digging grave and from Ignatius Haskell, Jr. for making E. Dunham's coffin—so Elijah, Sr. died not long before 1 Feb. 1813. Ruth was his 2nd wife." As Ruth Dunham of Deer Isle she married soon after Elijah's death to Ezekiel Alexander.

The first permanent settlement on Deer Isle was made in 1762 by William Eaton. Elijah Dunham and his two sons, Elijah Dunham, Jr. and Joseph Dunham came in 1766. The town of Deer Isle was incorporated in 1789. In 1800 Deer Isle had a population of 1105 people in 179 families.

Elijah Dunham appears on the 1790 Census 1-2-1.

Elijah Dunham appears on the 1798 tax record of Deer Isle, Hancock Co. ME [Ref. Vol. 1; p. 223]

From *The New England Historical and Genealogical Register*, pub. Boston, MA: Vol. 105, pp 204-207, Article by Walter Goodwin Davis "Part of Hancock County, Maine, in 1800". The 1800 census for Hancock County contains a column 'From whence emigrated', however of the two men who took the 1800 census only George Halliburton made use of this column. Fortunately for the purposes of the inhabitants of Deer Isle, George Halliburton was the enumerator and so we have the notation for the name **Elijah Dunham, 3—4, C. St. George's**. In the case of Elijah Dunham on the 1800 census this means there were 3 males and 4 females in the household and that the oldest male was "of 45 and upwards". So, Elijah ⁶ was born before 1755 and last resided in St. George's.

Jeffrey M. Dunham has worked on this family for a long time and his research shows that Elijah Dunham purchased 2 lots in St. Andrews, New Brunswick in 1790 and then sold those lots one year later. Deer Isle history supports that this is the Elijah Dunham of Deer Isle stating that Elijah left for some time and then returned. Thus, the statement that Elijah Dunham last resided in St. George's would indicate that he was living in St. George's, NB prior to the 1800 census, and that he was now back living on Deer Isle.

References to the sons of Elijah ⁶ Dunham from published sources include:

"When Revolution Came" the story of Old Deer Isle in the province of Maine during the war for American Independence, by Vernal Hutchinson, pub. In 1972: It tells the story of the men who fought the British at Majorbagaduce, 25 miles from Deer Isle, "an ill-fated expedition" to capture a British garrison located at Castine on the Penobscot Peninsula. This action took place in August of 1779.

George G. Choate was son of Joseph and Mary Choate, and was born 6 March 1767 in Newburyport, MA. He married Joanna Silloway. They resided in Newburyport MA.

3. Joseph ⁷ Dunham (Elijah ⁶ Nathaniel ⁵ Eleazer ^{4,3} Joseph ² John ¹) born say 1756, died 7 February 1834. He married **Mary/Polly (Staples) widow of Charles Chatto**. From Ancestry.com, Joseph m. in Blue Hill, Hancock Co. Maine 25 Feb. 1811 Mary Staples (1777-1850). However I think this was a second marriage for Joseph, and that he had a first wife who was the mother of the children given below. It should be noted that Mary Staples had married first Charles Chatto at Deer Isle, Hancock Co. Maine on 10 Dec. 1797 had had 4 children by him. John Chatto (1799-1872; Zeruah Chatto (1801-1876); Charles Chatto (1803-1880); Joshua Stales Chatto (1805-1884). Mary Staples was born at Deer Isle 17 Sept 1777; d. Blue Hill, Hancock Co. ME 1850.

Joseph ⁷ Dunham must have married a first wife prior to his marriage to Mary (Staples) Chatto, and as I look at the naming pattern of children who were probably from this first wife the name Mary Cary/Carey seems to predominate. Therefore my hypothesis is that this first wife could have been named Mary Carey. The intention of marriage of Joseph ⁷ Dunham to Mary Chatto in Oct. 1810 calls him "of St. Andrews" (NB).

Children of first wife (possibly Mary Cary/Carey) [these children are unproven but circumstantial evidence suggests their placement here as children of Joseph ⁷ and a first wife)

However, Jeffrey Dunham states that Jean Grindel married a Stephen Dunham who was born in 1813, and that after Jean Grindle died, Stephen married Elizabeth B. Leland. This needs to be straightened out.

With reference to a short list of baptisms noted by Rev. John Beardsley the following will be of interest:

Rev. John Beardsley, b. in Connecticut in 1732; died in Kingston, New Brunswick (Canada) in 1810. He had been Chaplin of the loyalist New York regiment of Col. Beverley Robinson in Jan. of 1783. After the Revolution he immigrated with the loyalists to New Brunswick, and in 1784 became rector of the church at Maugerville.

Rev. John Beardsley kept a notebook in which he recorded baptisms both in Maugerville and in those parishes where he occasionally visited as an itinerant minister. He visited settlements on both sides of the Saint John River. [Ref. Dictionary of Canadian Biography, Vol. 5, pub. 1983 Univ. of Toronto]

Richard Thorne found a register of baptisms by Rev. Beardsley under date of 9 July 1798. While the register does not state where these baptisms took place, it is logical to suppose that they were done on one of Rev. Beardsley's visits to settlements along both sides of the Saint John River, one of which was St. Andrews where we have a record of Joseph ⁷ Dunham.

- From Squires, "History of the 104th Regiment of Foot" p. 207; "Dunham, Samuel – Private, Sergeant, Enlisted: 3 Dec. 1803; Died 5 Sep 1813."
- From York County Probate: Administration of Samuel Dunham's Estate granted to Margaret Dunham 1 Aug. 1814 – described as her late husband.

- S'gt Dunham witnessed St. John, NB wedding of Henry Boggle of 104th Regiment of Foot to Elizabeth (Ricketts) Landport on 4 Dec. 1812, Saint John County Marriage Register, PANB

Extract from a ledger presented to the New Brunswick Historical Society by Sir John C. Allen, Chief Justice of New Brunswick and published by Jonas Howe in the Collections of

the New Brunswick Historical Society Vol. 1 p. 13-56, 1894; the ledger contains a list of soldiers raised largely in Charlotte Co. and organized in three companies. Peter Clinch from Charlotte County commanded one of the three companies and the Anglican clergyman, Rev. John Bearsley, was chaplain to the Regiment. Included among the enlisted men were Private Joseph Dunham in Captain Clinch's Co., enlisted 8 June 1793 and Private Samuel Dunham, Captain Clinch's Co. enlisted 8 June, 1793. This Regiment was disbanded in 1802 but the 104th Regiment of Foot was raised about a year later. See above bullet which states that Samuel Dunham enlisted in the 104th Regiment of Foot in December of 1803.

Please see addenda to this article for more information about Capt. Peter Clinch and the 104th Regiment of Foot and a book published in 2014 which describes the regiment and its perilous winter march to Sackets Harbor. It is very likely that Samuel Dunham was a part of that march and his death in Sept. 1813 may have been a result of the march or one of the battles which followed.

New Brunswick Dunhams and the 104th Regiment of Foot

Early in the summer of 1794 a company of men led by Capt. Peter Clinch of the King's New Brunswick Regiment that had been stationed at St. Andrews, was withdrawn. This caused concern by the inhabitants of this seaport town and a petition was signed by the magistrates and leading citizens of St. Andrews which stated that a large number of the militia of Charlotte County (Canada) had enlisted into Captain Clinch's company and that these men were mostly resident in St. Andrews and were ready upon any emergency to come to its defense.

Authority was granted to raise four provincial regiments of infantry, one in Nova Scotia, one in Newfoundland, one in Canada, and one in New Brunswick. These regiments were to serve only in their respective provinces and were not part of the regular British establishment. In 1799 the status of the provincial regiments was changed to that of fencibles (from the word defensible). In 1802 with the Peace of Amiens these regiments were disbanded.

However, in 1803 hostilities again required British regiments and on 6 July 1803, Brigadier-General Martin Hunter was granted authority to raise a corps to be known as His Majesty's New Brunswick Regiment of Fencible Infantry. His new regiment was to be part of the regular establishment of the British Army, although its service was restricted to North America. By 1810 the fencibles were elevated to an infantry regiment of the line. As the 104th (New Brunswick) Regiment of Foot, the unit could be moved to any British garrison or theatre of operations.

When war with the United States broke out in June 1812, detachments of the 104th were posted throughout New Brunswick. The buildup of American troops in the Sackets Harbor area during the winter of 1812-13 implied an invasion of Upper Canada. To strengthen the defenses of Upper Canada, six companies of the 104th were to be sent overland to Quebec, and then on to Kingston. Over a period of four days starting on 16 February 1813 successive companies set out from Fredericton on snowshoes. Temperatures of -25° F and bitter weather made this march through the wilderness to Quebec and on to Kingston a perilous experience.

Recent Book describes the perilous Winter March

The bicentennial of the War of 1812 produced some important literature about the period. "*The 104th (New Brunswick) Regiment of Foot in the War of 1812*" written by John R. Grodzinski, and published by New Brunswick Military Heritage as Vol. 21 in 2014 is such a book. The book is a history of the regiment from its beginnings to the disbanding in 1817. It describes the perilous winter march through the wilds of Canada in great detail.
