Eric Dunham, of Dunham Cellars:

Walla Walla, Washington Wine Maker

The obituary of Eric Michael Dunham's father, Michael Dale Dunham, was posted in the DSFC issue of 15 July 2013. It is now the duty of DSFC to report another death, much too soon after the previous one in this Dunham family. Together with his parents, Eric founded Dunham Cellars in 1997, and developed it into one of the premier wineries in the state of Washington. Forty-four year old Eric Dunham died October 23, 2014 in Cannon Beach, Oregon.

After growing up in Walla Walla Valley Eric joined the U. S. Navy where he served in aviation maintenance in the San Francisco Bay area. Following his service he completed an internship with Hogue Cellars where he was hired as assistant winemaker at L'Ecole N⁰ 41. In 1997, following the commercial success of his first four vintages, Eric and his parents launched the Dunham Cellars winery.

An article published in the Walla Walla Union-Bulletin on Feb. 5, 2003 praises the wine making skills of Dunham Cellars. Speaking specifically of Eric the article states, "His winemaking has garnered Dunham Cellars medals in national competitions and mention in world wine magazines' best-of lists. Not only is he know for artistry in making wine, his handpainted designer bottles have commanded thousands of dollars at benefit auctions."

Eric Dunham donated his wines and his time to philanthropic organizations throughout the United States. He was a talented chef and loved to cook and entertain. Eric is survived by his wife, Kanae Nishimura Dunham, and two year old son Hikari Michael Dunham. He was

preceded in death by his father, Michael Dale Dunham, his mother, Phyllis Dunham Kepler, and his grandparents Wendell and Shirley (Mays) Dunham.

Family Descends from the Tennessee Dunham Line

A Joseph Dunham, born say 1705, was the probable head of the Dunham Families of Tennessee. Two young men, John and Daniel Dunham, are of record in the early settlement of Fort Nashborough, later Nashville, Tennessee. While we are not certain of the origin of these two men prior to their appearance in Fort Nashborough in 1780, we can speculate that they came with others who settled here. People came to these areas from Philadelphia, Baltimore, New Jersey, Virginia, North Carolina, and as new immigrants. Many of the new immigrants were Scots-Irish.

Joseph ¹ Dunham, the probable father of John ² and Daniel ² Dunham, could have come from any of these above groups. Another man, Henry H. Dunham was probably also a son of Joseph ¹ Dunham. Henry H. ² Dunham was born about 1750 in Shenandoah County, Virginia. He died in 1820 in Wake County, North Carolina. His wife was Elizabeth Medlin who he married about 1775 in Rutherford County, North Carolina.

From Henry H. ² Dunham the line continues:

Michael Dale ⁸ Dunham participated in DNA analysis. His DNA test shows a close match to another man who took the DNA test in 2009. A third man who is believed to be from this line has also taken the DNA test. The DNA tests show these men to belong to haplogroup R1b1a2.

This Dunham family line is documented on the Dunham-Singletary Family Connections web site, www.dunham-singletary.org under Dunham Families, and by selecting Dunham Families of Tennessee. The web site carries the line out to John Sebron ⁴ Dunham (18251879+), and lists the children of John Sebron ⁴ and his wife Margaret (Pitman) Dunham.

My research article on the following pages will continue this Dunham family line down to the present generation.

The Tennessee Dunham family begins with Joseph ¹ Dunham, his son Henry H. ² Dunham born about 1750 in Shenandoah County, Virginia. Richard ³ Dunham was born 14 February 1795 in Rutherford Co., NC; d. in Union County, IL 1 January 1874. The son of Richard ³ Dunham and his first wife Elizabeth was John Sebron ⁴ Dunham. John Sebron ⁴ Dunham was born 25 May 1825 and died in Illinois after 1879. He married in Dekalb County, Tennessee on 15 August 1849 Margaret Pitman. She was born 1833 in TN; d. after June 1880 in IL

As can be seen in the 1880 census (above) James ⁵ Dunham appears in that census living in South Pass, Union County, Illinois. James ⁵ Dunham appears in the 1900 census in Cobden, Union County, Illinois with a wife named Dora who he married in 1881. The birth month of James was September, and the year given was 1854, in Alabama. From Union County Marriage records James Dunham married Dora Baggett in Cobden on July 12, 1881. The bride was Pandora Baggett, daughter of William A. and Martha (Reese) Baggett. Dora (Baggett) Dunham died March 10, 1932 and is buried in Flint, Genesee County, Michigan in Sunset Hills Cemetery. Van ⁶ Dunham appears on the 1910 census of Sikeston, Scott County, Missouri living with his wife Ruth, sister Dessie, and mother Dora. Dora is still living with Van Dunham and family in 1920 in Big Prairie, New Madrid County, Missouri. By 1930 Van Dunham and family together with his mother Dora Dunham are living in Flint, Genesee County, Michigan.

Van ⁶ Dunham died August 15, 1945 and is buried in Sunset Hills Cemetery, Flint, Michigan. His wife, Ruth Mae (White) Dunham died in 1953 and is also buried in Sunset Hills Cemetery.

John Franklin "Frank" Dunham



John Franklin Dunham (1884-1949)

John Franklin ⁶ Dunham, called "Frank", was born in Union County, Illinois 6 April 1884. He moved to Missouri for a number of years and then back east to Flint, Genesee County, Michigan where he died 18 July 1949. He married first in New Madrid County, Missouri 3 April 1906 Katie B. Sizemore. This couple had a daughter who died as an infant in 1907, and four sons. Katie (Sizemore) Dunham died in Missouri after the birth of her fourth son and Frank married second Kathryn McCary on 9 June 1919. Three children were born to Frank and Kathryn (McCary) Dunham. John Franklin ⁶ Dunham died in Flint, Genesee County, Michigan 18 July 1949. He is buried in Sunset Hills Cemetery, Flint, Michigan.

Benjamin Wendall ⁷ called Wendall, Dunham was born in Matthews, New Madrid County, Missouri; died in Walla Walla, Washington 30 November 1986. He married in Walla Walla on 21 July 1939 Shirley Maureen Mays. Wendall Dunham is buried at Blue Mountain Memorial Gardens, College Place, Walla Walla County, Washington. His wife, Shirley (Mays) Dunham who died 8 June 1983 is also buried at Blue Mountain Memorial Gardens.

Wendall ⁷ and Shirley (Mays) Dunham were the parents of Michael Dale ⁸ Dunham who died in Walla Walla, Washington on May 18, 2013.

Michael Dale ⁸ Dunham was the father of Eirc ⁹ Dunham born May 30, 1970, who died October 23, 2014.

Eric is survived by two sisters, Michelle (Dunham) Sikma and Kat (Dunham) Duty.



The Way They Went to Michigan

The October 2011 issue of DSFC contained an article about the ancestors of Matthew Dunham, chairmaker, of Carlton, Orleans County, New York. From research done at that time the line to which Matthew Dunham belongs descends from Deacon John ¹ Dunham through Jonathan ², Jonathan ³, Hezekiah ⁴, Matthew ⁵ and Matthew ⁶ and his wife Ruth Strong. This couple had three sons, James ⁷ b. in Tyringham, MA 28 December 1782; Matthew ⁷ b. in Stockbridge, MA 28 October 1784; and Charles ⁷ b. about 1787 in Berkshire County, MA. These three brothers, together with their father Matthew ⁶ came to Carlton, New York and built a saw mill on Johnson's Creek. The family became well known for making chairs and established the Dunham Chair Works in Carlton New York. (see photo of chair in DSFC newsletter Vol. 9, Issue 1, p. 2-3)

Of these seventh generation sons, James ⁷ married about 1802 Mary Ward. James ⁷ and Mary (Ward) Dunham had four children before James' untimely death 13 February 1811. Mary (Ward) Dunham married second Stephen Jennings, and they moved to Berrien County, Michigan.

Timothy Ward ⁸ Dunham and his son James Rossel ⁹ Dunham owned considerable property right along the shore of Lake Michigan in the Village of Stevensville, Town of Lincoln, Berrien County, Michigan. This land included large sand dunes and three fresh water ponds. The area was recently saved from commercial and resort development and is now the Grand Mere Park. When the Dunhams owned this land they operated an Ice House located between Grand Mere North and Middle lakes. The shallow Grand Mere South was a vast cranberry bog, flooded to protect the berries in the winter and drained for harvesting in the summer.





Timothy Ward ⁸ Dunham b. in Bloomfield, Livingstone County New York 12 January 1808; died in St. Joseph, Berrien County Michigan 11 February 1899. He married in Kalamazoo Michigan 28 June 1835 **Catherine P. Newman**, daughter of Enos and Patty (Patterson) Newman. She was born 23 August 1810, died 12 July 1892.

From a pamphlet about **OLD HOMESTEAD TEA ROOM of GRAND MERE PARK**, Stevensville, Michigan; S. Ella Dunham, Proprietor:

"The Dunham estate was originally purchased by T. W. Dunham in 1865. It then consisted of 1600 acres of thickly wooded lands. Forests of white pine covered the dry ground, while the swamps were dense with cedar and tamarack, and in the marshes, flourished wild grass and cranberries. In those early days the place was the scene of much activity while these native products were harvested. A saw-mill was constructed, corduroy roads and car tracks were laid; a pier was built into the lake and a scow, called the M. N. Dunham, was made and launched at the pier. Now there are few traces of these monarchs of the past."
