PAT DUNHAM, 50 Page Way, Fortuna, CA 95540, is searching for more information on AARON DUNHAM (1785-1855), who migrated from Skaneateles, NY, to the Ohio Valley & then on to Michigan, where he was probably located in Ionia County. One of the noteworthy things about this man is that he was reported to have had 17 children, although the given names of only 4 are recorded: Silas (b. 1810); Elizabeth (b. 1818); John M. (b. 1822); & Shenandoah (b. 1824). INITIAL RESPONSE: According to IWD this Aaron looks to be our D-174537, a member of the 6th generation in America, with this ancestral line: 1. Deacon John Dunham, 2. Joseph, 3. Micaiah, 4. Micaiah, 5. David. The Michigan 1850 census does not show a household headed by a man named Aaron Dunham. He might still have been in Ohio at that time, or else he could have been living in someone else's home.

GRATIA LOOKS AT "SILVER DANIEL"

From Gratia Mahony, responding to the lead article in the April 1998 DD about Daniel Dunham & the buried silver:

Any article about buried treasure is intriguing, and the article in the April 1998 issue of DUNHAM DISPATCH is doubly so. Not only would it be good to know the ancestry of the mysterious Daniel Dunham, but it would of course be nice to know where the silver was buried.

While I can't solve the question of the latter, I can point our readers to the ancestral line of Daniel Dunham. The line of this Daniel is covered in a book by Ray Fields Dawson, Ph.D, The Dunhams of Callaway, privately printed, Winter Park, Florida 1981. In an article by Ray F. Dawson in the Mayflower Quarterly Vol. 63:343, the story of the buried treasure is repeated.

The article is about Missouri Mounted Militiamen who went with Santa Anna to Mexico in 1846-47, and on their return to Missouri they looted mines and public treasuries en route. Within a few miles of the Nueces Crossing into Texas they were overtaken and all killed but Daniel Dunham who escaped. In Austin Texas, in 1873 Dunham signed a deposition on his death bed in which he described the location of the treasures they buried before they were overtaken.

The ancestry of Daniel is "unproved" because there is no Vital Record of his birth. It is likely that Daniel was born en route as his family was moving from Western Virginia to Callaway County Missouri. The line as given by Dr. Dawson, is from Deacon John (1) Dunham; Benajah (2) Dunham who went to Piscataway New Jersey; Edmund (3); Edmund (4); Daniel (5); Archelaus (6); and Daniel (7) born in 1791 who married 17 November 1817 Nancy Wilkinson. Daniel (7) and Nancy lived in Harrison County West Virginia where two children were born. These were George W. (8) born 5 January 1822; and Jane (8) born 1 November 1824. On 15 September 1826 Daniel and Nancy (Wilkinson) Dunham liquidated their holdings in West Virginia and prepared to move to Callaway County Missouri. The next recorded children born to Daniel and Nancy are Samuel (8) b. 23 April 1828; Irvin Hockaday (8) b. 30 March 1830; Mary Ann (8) b. 3 September 1833; and Edward (8) b. 20 May 1838. These last four were born in Callaway County Missouri. It is the belief of Dr. Dawson, and one which I support, that Daniel, the Missouri Mounted Militiaman, was a son of Daniel (7) and Nancy (Wilkinson) Dunham, and was born during the transition from Virginia to Missouri.
