Editor's Corner

The Dunham line found on Deer Isle, Maine has been difficult to document. The first Dunham found there was Elijah Dunham who came to Deer Isle in 1766 with his two young sons, Elijah and Joseph. Several members of the Dunham Genealogy Research Association descend from this complex line. Part of the problem is that these Dunhams were in the area very early in its settlement, and part of the problem is that they seemed to go back and forth between this part of Maine and what was later Charlotte County, New Brunswick, Canada. Thus locating all the records of birth, marriage and death has been a challenge. I have been working on this line (from time to time) since 1999. I have been helped in this research by the other members who include our President, Jeff Dunham.

One of the research methods I like to use is to prove as many of the Dunham lines as possible. This then will eliminate from consideration the proven lines and allow me to focus on the undocumented lines. There were several Dunham lines who went to Canada; one line to Yarmouth, another to Nova Scotia, and other Dunhams apart from the line that originated on Deer Isle are found in New Brunswick, Canada.

As I approached the 15 January, 2019 time to issue the newsletter, I was still a long way from completing my article on the Deer Isle Dunhams. I think it is important to publish a complete and comprehensive line of this family in one issue. Therefore, I will accomplish this by publishing a "double issue" which will be the 15 January and 15 April, 2019 issues together in one issue.

"What's New on the Dunham Website" by James A. Streeter



In Memory Of

Paul C. Dunham, age 87, of Helena

April 11, 1931 – January 26, 2019



Paul C. Dunham passed away peacefully at the age of 87 in Helena, Montana on January 26, 2019. He was the loving and devoted husband of the late Margaret Dunham, who passed away in December of 2012.

He was born in Corinna, Maine in 1931 and grew up with humble beginnings in Vermont. Paul and his brother and sisters happily survived for many years without running water or electricity, spending their time gathering firewood, collecting sap for maple syrup and doing odd jobs to help out. He graduated from Montpelier High School in 1949, all the while working on various farms in the morning and a drug store after school. In 1950, he joined the National Guard and was eventually

called to active duty in the Army 43rdInfantry Division and was shipped to Germany as part of the occupation forces. He completed his duty in 1952 as a Sergeant and returned to Vermont. His friend took him to see the dean of the University of Vermont, who invited him to enroll. He graduated with a BA in 1959 and a MA in 1963, both in political science.

Paul eventually worked in the chancellor's office at the University of Maine as the director for institutional research. He was at the forefront of computer technology at that time and used mainframes to automate many tasks at the university. With his friend Irv, he started the first credit union for the U of Maine. In 1976, he moved his family to Helena where he worked for the Office of the Commissioner for the Montana University Systems. He concluded his career as the computer center manager for the Montana Higher Education Student Assistance Corporation, finally retiring in 1994.

In retirement, Paul kept busy with a variety of activities. He was very active in genealogy and helped to start the Dunham-Singletary Family Connections group. He also volunteered at the Lewis & Clark Library. He and Margaret participated in several local square dance groups and travelled to square dance events around Montana. He enjoyed the outdoors, particularly hiking, running and camping. He travelled around the country to spend time with his children and grandchildren, and enjoyed playing cribbage and going to sporting events with his friends Dave and Steve.

Paul is survived by his children Barbara (Kathleen) and Bruce (Diane); four grandchildren, Emilie, Audrey, Finnegan and Gwendolyn; and his sister Fay Tucker. In addition to his wife, he is predeceased by his brother John, and sisters Alice and Suzie.

Editor's Note: Paul Clinton Dunham was instrumental in reviving the Dunham Family Association and served us in developing the Dunham Families in America web site and placing the early information onto the web site. Paul was also one of the first men to participate in Y-DNA testing and established the haplogroup for descendants of the Deacon John Dunham line.
