'Dunham' Is Place Name With Several Origins

When we investigate a surname to find its origin and meaning we sometimes find that a single name can have several meanings and even several origins.

Since this report does not concern itself with a particular genealogical branch, we attempt to track down and report on all of the origins and meanings which apply to the particular name.

Dunham is such a name, in that it has more than one possible meaning and origin. The most common and most accepted meaning of the name is "a dweller of swarthy complexion living at a homestead or enclosure." It can also mean someone who comes from a place called Dunham or someone who lives at Dun's nomestead.

Dun comes from the Old English "dunn" meaning "dull brown" or "dark and swarthy." As a nickname this word was applied to the color of a person's hair or his complexion. Anglo-Saxons used Dun, Dunne and Dunna as personal names. In some instruces the word may be related to Thor, the Norse God of Thunder, while in others it may be from the Middle English "dun" which means "hill."

Ham is a suffix and generally means homestead or enclosure. It is one of the most common English place name endings, as accessed to by the old rhyme: "... ford, in ham, in ley, in too, the most of English surnames run."

In general the name is considered a place name, whichever particular meaning it may have, since it refers to the dwelling place of the individual mentioned. During the time of Henry III and Edward I trees are records of a Joel de Dunham and a Reginald de Dunham, both of whom are from County Norfolk. There are two Dunhams in County Norfolk: Great Dunham and Little Dunham. In southwell there is a Dunham-on-Trent. A person who came from any of these three

places or any other place so named would have been listed in the records as "de Dunham." Later the prefix "de" fell into disuse and, as the identification remained with the individual and his descendants, the surname Dunham arose.

An important contribution to literature was made by Dr. S. Astley Dunham, who wrote "History of Poland,"

"History of Spain and Portugal" and "History of Europe During the Middle Ages." He also wrote a history of the Germanic Empire which is used extensively at the present time. Interested in your na

The "What's in your name?" series by the Sanson Institute ran in many newspapers for a long time & was very popular. This column on the Dunham name appeared in THE PENSACOLA (FL) JOURNAL on December 2, 1968 & comes to DD from Sue C. Stewart, Puryear, TN. The multiple origins of the name would seem to imply that persons who originally assumed the surname of DUNHAM were not necessarily related to one another. Is the name of S. Astley Dunham a familiar one to any reader? We haven't come across it here, but of course individuals who use their second name rather than their first often get confused or mislaid in genealogical records, & the article gives no time frame or geographic area

that might assist in identification. The coat of arms shown in the article is completely different from the more familiar one in the I. W.D. genealogy & the Sophie Dunham Moore genealogy., with the "Semper Vigilante" motto. That one, re-drawn, appeared in the December 1977 DD. (Maybe it is about time that it be reprinted; what do you think?)

NOTE: Any listings of Dunhams in any particular state or county from 1850 or later have been gathered from the census index of that state & year. Codes following the names will enable you to get the names, birthplaces, & ages of all individuals in that home, & usually the relationship of each individual to the head of the household. If the reel of microfilm in which it appears is not available at your local library, you can rent it for a nominal sum through interlibrary loan.

She came to Hancock with her parents in 1868, who settled on a homestead about three miles northwest of the village.



Authorities Identify Body Found in Alna, Maine

ALNA, Maine (AP) — The body of man found in this Lincoln County town has been positively identified as 24-year-old Michael Dunham of Whitefield, and state police said he was the victim of a homicide.

Dunham, whose mother and siblings live in the Lewiston-Auburn area, had been missing since late January, said Stephen McCausland of the state Public Safety Department. Dunham's car was found parked at the narrow-gauge railroad station in Alna on Jan. 25, McCausland said.

Identification of the body was confirmed Sunday, McCausland said.
